# A BILL

  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

## **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Placing Restrictions
5 on Teargas Exports and Crowd Control Technology to
6 Hong Kong Act" or "PROTECT Hong Kong Act".

#### 1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND STATEMENT OF POLICY.

2 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:

3 (1) During the 2019 anti-extradition bill and
4 pro-democracy protests, the Hong Kong Police
5 Force used non-lethal crowd control articles such as
6 water cannon trucks, tear gas, rubber bullets,
7 sponge grenades, beanbag rounds, batons, pepper
8 spray, pepper balls, and projectile launchers.

9 (2) The United Nations High Commissioner for 10 Human Rights, along with human rights organiza-11 tions, have called for an investigation of the use of 12 crowd control tactics used in Hong Kong which fall 13 short of international standards, including the 14 United Nations Code of Conduct for Law Enforce-15 ment Officials and the Basic Principles on the Use 16 of Force and Firearms for Law Enforcement Offi-17 cials.

(3) United States companies received export licenses to sell the Hong Kong Police Force munitions
and non-lethal crowd control defense articles and
services and at least some of those articles were used
by the police unnecessarily and disproportionately
during largely peaceful demonstrations.

24 (4) The Government of the United Kingdom
25 suspended export licenses for the sale of tear gas
26 and other non-lethal crowd control equipment to

Hong Kong until concerns about human rights
 abuses are addressed by the Hong Kong Special Ad ministrative Region government.

4 (5) The European Parliament adopted a resolu5 tion calling on European governments and the inter6 national community to impose export-control mecha7 nisms to deny the Hong Kong and Chinese govern8 ments access to technologies used to violate basic
9 rights.

10 (6) Hong Kong citizens and the international
11 community have called for changes to the Hong
12 Kong Police's crowd control tactics and these re13 quests have gone unheeded by the Hong Kong Spe14 cial Administrative Region government.

15 (b) STATEMENT OF POLICY.—It is the policy of the16 United States—

(1) to restrict the export of security assistance
and crime control and detection instruments and
equipment to any country the government of which
engages in a consistent pattern of gross violations of
internationally recognized human rights as required
by section 502B(a) of the Foreign Assistance Act of
1961 (22 U.S.C. 2304(a)); and

(2) to use export controls on crime control anddetection instruments and equipment to deter the

development of a consistent pattern of human rights
 abuses, distance the United States from such
 abuses, and avoid contributing to civil disorder in a
 country or region in accordance with section
 742.7(b) of part 774 of subtitle B of title 15, Code
 of Federal Regulations.

7 SEC. 3. PROHIBITION ON COMMERCIAL EXPORT OF COV8 ERED DEFENSE ARTICLES AND SERVICES
9 AND COVERED MUNITIONS ITEMS TO THE
10 HONG KONG DISCIPLINED SERVICES.

(a) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in subsection
(b), beginning on the date that is 30 days after the date
of the enactment of this Act, the President shall prohibit
the issuance of licenses to export covered defense articles
and services and covered munitions items to the Hong
Kong Disciplined Services.

17 (b) EXCEPTION.—The prohibition in subsection (a)18 shall not take effect if—

(1) the President certifies to the appropriate
congressional committees before the date specified in
such subsection (a) that—

(A) extraordinary circumstances exist that
necessitate the continuation of the export of
covered defense articles and services and covered munitions items to the Hong Kong Dis-

1	ciplined Services and includes a description of
2	such circumstances; or
3	(B) exports of covered defense articles and
4	services and covered munitions items to parts of
5	the Hong Kong Disciplined Services other than
6	the Hong Kong Police Force are required to ad-
7	vance United States foreign policy goals and in-
8	cludes—
9	(i) a description of the articles, serv-
10	ices, and items; and
11	(ii) the number of articles, services,
12	and items required to meet such goals; or
13	(2) the President has issued an Executive
14	Order under section 202 of the United States-Hong
15	Kong Policy Act of 1992 (22 U.S.C. 5722) before
16	the date specified in such subsection (a) suspending
17	the application of section 201(a) of such Act to any
18	United States law related to the sale of covered de-
19	fense articles and services and covered munitions
20	items to the Hong Kong Disciplined Services.

SEC. 4. REPORT ON COVERED DEFENSE ARTICLES AND
 SERVICES AND COVERED MUNITIONS ITEMS
 EXPORTED TO THE HONG KONG DISCIPLINED
 SERVICES.

(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 90 days after the 5 date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State, 6 7 in consultation with the Secretary of Commerce and the heads of other relevant Federal departments and agencies, 8 9 shall submit to the appropriate congressional committees a report that lists and provides a description of all covered 10 defense articles and services and covered munitions items 11 exported to the Hong Kong Disciplined Services during 12 the five-year period ending on such date of enactment. 13

14 (b) FORM.—The report required by subsection (a)15 shall be—

16 (1) submitted in unclassified form; and

17 (2) submitted as either a separate written re18 port or as an annex to testimony offered by Depart19 ment of State officials before one or more of the ap20 propriate congressional committees.

#### 21 SEC. 5. DEFINITIONS.

22 In this Act:

23 (1) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMIT24 TEES.—The term "appropriate congressional com25 mittees" means—

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1	(A) the Committee on Foreign Affairs of
2	the House of Representatives; and
3	(B) the Committee on Foreign Relations of
4	the Senate.
5	(2) COVERED DEFENSE ARTICLES AND SERV-
6	ICES.—The term "covered defense articles and serv-
7	ices" means defense articles and defense services
8	designated by the President under section $38(a)(1)$
9	of the Arms Export Control Act (22 U.S.C.
10	2778(a)(1)).
11	(3) Covered munitions items.—The term
12	"covered munitions items" means—
13	(A) items controlled under section 742.7 of
14	part 742 of subtitle B of title 15, Code of Fed-
15	eral Regulations (relating to crime control and
16	detection instruments and equipment and re-
17	lated technology and software); and
18	(B) items listed under the "600 series" of
19	the Commerce Control List contained in Sup-
20	plement No. 1 to part 774 of subtitle B of title
21	15, Code of Federal Regulations.
22	(4) HONG KONG.—The term "Hong Kong" has
23	the meaning given such term in section 3 of the
24	United States-Hong Kong Policy Act of $1992$ (22
25	U.S.C. 5702).

1	(5) Hong kong disciplined services.—The
2	term "Hong Kong Disciplined Services" means—
3	(A) the Hong Kong Police Force;
4	(B) the Hong Kong Auxiliary Police Force;
5	(C) the Hong Kong Immigration Depart-
6	ment;
7	(D) the Hong Kong Customs and Excise
8	Department;
9	(E) the Hong Kong Fire Services Depart-
10	ment;
11	(F) the Hong Kong Correctional Services
12	Department; and
13	(G) the Hong Kong Government Flying
14	Service.
