A BILL

To prohibit the provision of United States security assistance to the Government of Saudi Arabia, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. PROHIBITION ON SECURITY ASSISTANCE.

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Beginning on the date of the en5 actment of this Act, the Secretary of Defense may not—

6 (1) provide any United States assistance, in7 cluding security assistance, intelligence, training,
8 equipment, or services relating to maintenance, test9 ing, or technical data, to—

(A) the Government of Saudi Arabia, in cluding the Ministries of Defense, Interior, and
 Intelligence; or

4 (B) any agent or instrumentality of such5 Government; or

6 (2) engage in any defense cooperation with such 7 Government, Ministries, agents, or instrumentalities. 8 (b) EXCEPTION FOR THE PROTECTION OF UNITED 9 STATES PERSONNEL AND CITIZENS.—The prohibition under subsection (a) shall not apply with respect to activi-10 11 ties of the Department of Defense relating to the protec-12 tion of United States diplomatic and consular posts or personnel or to the evacuation of United States citizens. 13

14 SEC. 2. PROHIBITION ON ARMS SALES.

15 Beginning on the date of the enactment of this Act, 16 no defense article, defense service, or design and construc-17 tion service, as such terms are defined for purposes of the 18 Arms Export Control Act (22 U.S.C. 2751 et seq.), may 19 be sold or otherwise made available to the Government of 20 Saudi Arabia or to any agents or instrumentalities of such 21 Government. 2

1 SEC. 3. CASE-BY-CASE WAIVER OF PROHIBITIONS ON SECU-

RITY ASSISTANCE AND ARMS SALES.

(a) JOINT RESOLUTION OF APPROVAL TO WAIVE.— The prohibitions in sections 1 and 2 may be waived on

5 a case-by-case basis if—

6 (1) the President submits to the appropriate
7 congressional committees a request to conduct a spe8 cific activity otherwise prohibited by such sections;
9 and

10 (2) there is enacted a joint resolution approving
11 the waiver of such prohibition with respect to such
12 specific activity.

(b) REPORT ACCOMPANYING REQUEST.—Each request submitted pursuant to subsection (a)(1) shall also
include a report describing—

16 (1) how the requested activity would advance
17 the national security and defense interests of the
18 United States;

19 (2) the status of the United States investigation20 into each person who—

21 (A) authorized, ordered, carried out, or
22 had knowledge of the murder of journalist and
23 United States permanent resident Jamal
24 Khashoggi; or

1(B) participated in attempts to cover up2information regarding the murder of Mr.3Khashoggi;

4 (3) the extent to which each person described
5 pursuant to paragraph (2) has been prosecuted or
6 otherwise held accountable for such conduct; and

7 (4) the status of the protection of human
8 rights, including the freedom of the press, in Saudi
9 Arabia.

10 (c) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEES DE11 FINED.—In this section, the term "appropriate congres12 sional committees" means—

(1) the Committee on Armed Services and the
Committee on Foreign Affairs of the House of Representatives; and

16 (2) the Committee on Armed Services and the17 Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate.
